


November is Stewardship Month

From Pastor Kent's Desk



In November, we began the countdown for "The Holidays," that "catch-all" phrase which designates the best time of the commercial shopping year. The department stores can't wait for "The Holidays" as it is an opportunity for them make up their deficits from the rest of the year. Or, that's how it used to be, anyway. (With the entry of Amazon into the marketplace, those days are a thing of the past, I think!)

I remember when I was growing-up, I couldn't wait until the big brick-and-mortar "flagship stores" in downtown L.A. would be decorated for "The Holidays." My Mom and I would hop the bus and go downtown to The Broadway, The May Company, Bullocks, I. Magnin, Silverwood's, Desmond's, Sears, and a host of others. Not all of them had Santas and full-fledged toy departments, but their decorations were magical none-the-less. After Thanksgiving, Dad would always be working over-time and weekends at the Post Office right up until Christmas, so he wasn't able to go with us. We would, however, sneak in an evening to go downtown with him and look at the extraordinary window displays in the stores in the dark– they were fantastic!

In those days nothing happened until after Thanksgiving Day. It marked the "official" start of "The Holidays." We'd go to my Uncle and Aunts home in West Los Angeles where 18 or more of us would gather for the feast. And what a feast it was! I always sat at "the kids' table" with my other cousins, away from the "adult conversations" which were taking place at "the big table." It frustrated me to no-end that we were all still sitting at "the kids' table" when we were well into high school. You couldn't take your place at "the big table" until somebody died! Thankfully, they were all long-lived.

Along with the nut-cups, beautiful name tags, Jello salads filled with all sorts of strange fruit, turkey, mashed potatoes, dressing, and pie, was "The Prayer." Usually assigned to the eldest among us, it was always a work of literary and theological art. (Folks born in the late 19th century had a way with words!) I've yet to match their eloquence and I've been in ministry for forty-four years! There was a certain gravitas to their prayers as one would expect when one is praying to the Creator of the Universe. Nothing, as I remember, was left out, and their words still lingered when the meal was over.



As I look back, now, I'm thankful for those amazing gatherings. They were filled with "thanksgiving" for the blessings which God bestows on God's people. It was a time to sit and talk, to reflect on the year gone by, and to anticipate the good things to come in December. It wasn't rushed. Stores weren't open, and "Black Friday" wasn't even an idea yet. God was in our midst and gratitude filled our hearts. And that's the way it should be. I invite you to take time this Thanksgiving to live into the day and let it linger in your hearts and minds. It all goes by so very quickly! God is here with us now. And that reality gives us hope for this season and all seasons.




2019 Advent Study

We will be exploring Advent in new and exciting way during Advent 2019. Our guide will be a new book by author, professor, and renown biblical scholar, Amy-Jill Levine. The title of the

study is *Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent.* Dr. Levine is the University Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Vanderbilt Divinity School.

In the study, we will be focusing on the biblical texts surrounding the story of the birth of Jesus. We'll join Dr. Levine as she traces the Christmas narrative through the stories of Zechariah and Elizabeth, Mary, the journey to Bethlehem, and the visit from the Magi. These stories open conversations around connections of the Gospel stories to the Old Testament, the role of women in the first-century Jewish culture, the importance of Mary's visitation, and the revolutionary implications of Mary's Magnificat, the census and the stable, and the star of Bethlehem and the flight to Egypt.





Our study will begin on Wednesday morning, November 27, at 10am in Memorial Parlor. Copies of the book will be available in the Narthex, or from Rev. Holmes. Plan on joining us for what will be an intellectually stimulating and spiritually nurturing experience! It will be a wonderful addition to your Advent preparations.
